Diapers for children and adults through community partners

VISION

A community that believes that every child and adult has the right to a clean, dry diaper.

Facts you would never know.....

- Last year the Diaper Bank received requests for more than 1.5 million diapers for infants, seniors and the disabled, but due to its limited financial resources, was only able to collect and distribute 39% of those requests.
- Regardless of age or size, 6-10 diapers are needed daily (around \$100 per month).
- Public assistance is limited. Food assistance programs such as food stamps and WIC focus solely on food and nutrition, and therefore do not cover diapers. Low-income families and elderly depend upon the Diaper Bank for their supplies.

For Infants and Children it's a matter of hygiene and access to good childcare.

- 1 in 3 American moms struggle with diaper needs. They often cut back on food, utilities, and other necessities to provide diapers for their babies.
- 1 in 4 babies are born into poverty in Pima County.
- To be eligible to attend daycare programs, parents are often required to supply diapers for their children.

For Adults it is a matter of dignity and the opportunity to participate fully in life.

- 25% of diapers collected and distributed by the Diaper Bank are for adult incontinence needs.
- According to the National Association for Continence "More than half of all residents in nursing homes are incontinent and it is the second leading cause of institutionalization."
- Many disabled people are obliged to wear diapers for a variety of reasons, with inability to use a bathroom unaided or incontinence among the most common.

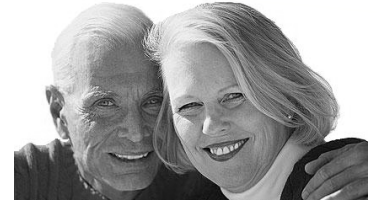
I care about the environment. Why supply disposable diapers instead of cloth?

- Some individuals don't have in-home washing facilities for cloth diapers, and most Laundromats don't allow cloth diapers to be washed for health and sanitary reasons.
- Most childcare and adult daycare facilities require disposable diapers.
- Adult supplies are not readily available or affordable in cloth.
