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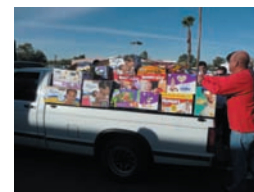

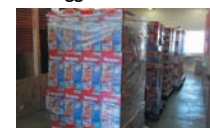
Strategic Goals

The Diaper Bank has seen an increase in need for our services as the economy has struggled. We are meeting this increased need with a new strategic plan including lofty goals. Today we distribute almost 600,000 diapers annually. In the next 5-10 years we plan to increase our distribution to 1.5 million.

We know this will take an incredible amount of support from the southern Arizona community, but in the end the Diaper Bank of Southern Arizona will be distributing as many diapers as are currently being requested. Together we can meet the new face of poverty with a package of diapers.

Financial Stability

- To ensure no less than 4 months of operating expenses
- To ensure we have a diverse stream of funding sources including but not limited to individuals, special events, foundations, corporations, government, faith based organizations, and nonprofits.
- To reduce Office and Warehouse expenses through facility ownership
- To establish Endowment Funds to ensure operation long into the future

Partnerships

- To prioritize relationships with partner agencies where the Diaper Bank is considered an irreplaceable major donor.
- To utilize community leaders as the primary liaisons with partner agencies.

Impact (Diaper Distribution)

- To provide 1.5 million diapers annually to the Southern Arizona community through partner agencies.
- To provide diapers at a cost of no more than .20 per diaper (750,000 diapers annually at a cost of \$150,000).

Human Resources

- To have adequate paid and volunteer staff to meet agency goals.

Greetings, Southern Arizona!

The Diaper Bank of Southern Arizona is the nation's first Diaper Bank. We've been serving the region and our community for 17 years.

Many know us best from the "Help Cover Our Butts" bus bench campaign, "The Bottom Line Newsletter," our recognizable diaper pin logo, and our groundbreaking best practices that paved the way for Diaper Banks across the country. I am pleased to share a few highlights of our work in southern Arizona along with our vision for the future.

Highlights from 2010-2011:

- Warehouse improvements courtesy of a local Eagle Scout, who constructed 15 bins, reducing risk of diaper collapse/slides, improving efficiency by 50% and safety of our volunteers and staff, and increasing storage space to allow for more diapers coming in and out.
- Operations modernization: Gone are the days of faxing requests! Our online diaper request system facilitates requests and communications with partner agencies. Agencies can complete their requests for diapers with ease online, and we are able to expedite processing, track inventory, and facilitate pick-up more readily.
- Our 5th annual Dancing With Our Stars special event was hugely successful and raised more than \$50,000.
- A cultivated relationship with Huggies, receiving shipments of 200,000 diapers last year.

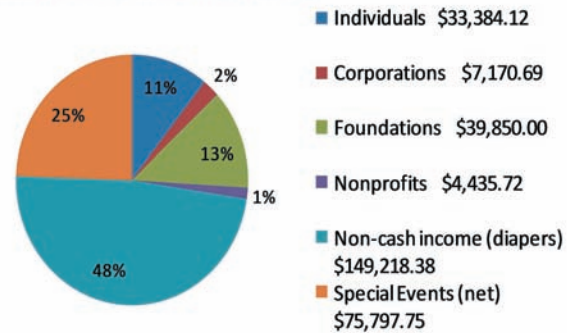

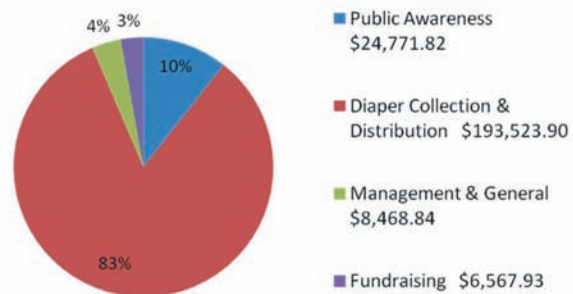

17 Years in the Making: A Brief History of the Diaper Bank

The Diaper Bank movement began in 1994 when a small consulting firm decided to give back to their local community during the holiday season. Resolve Inc., located in Tucson began their philanthropic endeavor by collecting diapers for a local crisis nursery. Their annual diaper collection tradition continued, and five years later they were able to collect 300,000 diapers for 30 different agencies. By this time the small consulting firm was spending six months a year preparing for the December Diaper Drive.

From 1996 until 1999 the Diaper Bank operated as a program under the nonprofit umbrella of the Carondelet Foundation. In 2000 the Community Diaper Bank of Southern Arizona became a free standing charitable organization, becoming the nation's first Diaper Bank.

The Diaper Bank of Southern Arizona hired its first employee in 1999 and still uses more than 100 volunteers annually to provide diapers and incontinence supplies to those in need. In 2004 the Diaper Bank of Southern Arizona shared a successful business model to begin championing diaper banks across the United States. In 2010, the name legally changed to Diaper Bank of Southern Arizona and today we are in a network with more than 80 Diaper Banks across the country.

Just as it did at its inception, the Diaper Bank of Southern Arizona provides diapers to those under the poverty line where no public assistance exists. We recognize that an inadequate supply of diapers puts families with young children at an increased risk for health related problems and potential abuse. Further, our community has one of the highest concentrations of older adults in the region. Incontinence supplies provide seniors with independence, dignity, and can delay institutionalization. We believe that through a network of social service providers the Diaper Bank prevents duplication of services, limits administrative spending, and prioritizes clients in the direst of circumstances to receive comprehensive assistance towards putting families back on their feet.

In the coming years the Diaper Bank of Southern Arizona aspires to meet 100% of the local need. To do this, we need your support.
